Municipality of the District of Lunenburg Outline of Seniors' Safety Program

Although the application is from South Shore Safe Communities, the request is more specifically for a project called the *Lunenburg County Seniors Safety Program*. The activities of the Seniors Safety Program are designed to address senior's safety issues, reduce incidences of elder abuse, and promote better communication between seniors and police. Funding will be used to operate the Lunenburg County Seniors Safety Program on a full-time basis. Services are offered to seniors in their homes and in the community. To ensure that all seniors can participate in our services, programs are typically offered at low or no cost. With the advice of seniors and our partners, we identify gaps in services and endeavor to fill those gaps with effective programs or awareness campaigns.

The total population of Lunenburg County was 47,234 in 2011, with 19.4% of the population aged 65+. The combined senior population in the Municipality of the District of Lunenburg (4,882), Town of Bridgewater (1,980), Town of Lunenburg (718), Municipality of the District of Chester (2,306), and Mahone Bay (300) was 10,186 in 2011. Of the total senior population, approximately 10 – 12% (at least 1,000 seniors) will experience some type of elder abuse. (Physical, emotional, financial, etc.) An additional 14.9% will suffer from dementia (1,522 seniors). The 2016 census report the total population of our county to be 47,126 (-.4%).

The Department of Seniors instituted the Seniors Safety Program in 2008 as a means to support their elder abuse strategy and to support the growing number of seniors in the province. The peak population growth will occur in 2025, which means we will need more services to support seniors than we have at present.

The growth of the *Lunenburg County Seniors Safety Program* since inception has been significant. In 2013, 131 home visits were made to seniors, and in 2014 the Senior Safety Coordinator made 189 home visits, an increase of 44% over the previous year. In 2015, a total of 360 home visits were made, an astounding 90% increase from 2014 and in 2016 we visited 380 seniors to assist them with their safety needs. Additionally, the program reaches hundreds of seniors and other community members through group programs and presentations yearly. We received 196 new referrals in 2017 and are currently serving 85 seniors residing in Lunenburg County. We've carried out 476 home visits this year. Please see attached Annual Report for 2017.

THE PROGRAM IN BRIEF:

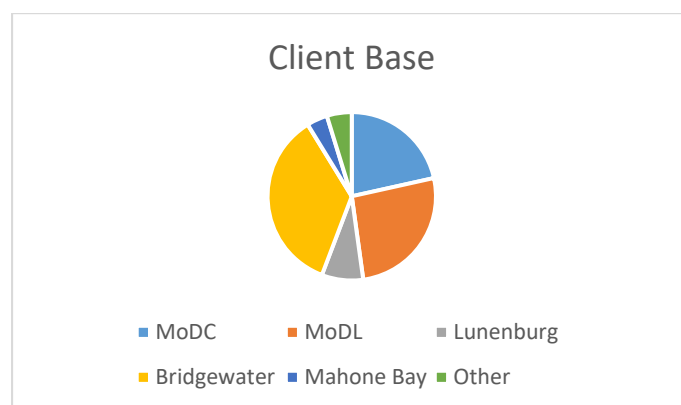
The Lunenburg County Seniors' Safety Program is a community-based program, operating under the umbrella of Safe Communities Lunenburg County, a non-profit organization and is advised by the LCSSAP. The program works collaboratively with law enforcement and many community partners to address the safety concerns of seniors living in Lunenburg County. To ensure that all seniors can participate in our services, programs are typically offered at no cost. The LCSSP is funded by the Dept. of Seniors, Community Health Board, United Way, MoDL, MoDC, town of Bridgewater, town of Mahone Bay and town of Lunenburg.

STAFFING:

We welcome newcomer Shona Brown as LC Seniors' Safety Coordinator, filling in for a term leave for Chris Acomb. Shona (and Chris) are responsible for the day to day operations of the LCSSP. This year also marked the addition of Katie Foley, part time administrative support person, working approximately 4 – 8 hours weekly in office. Both Katie and Shona are great assets to the team. The day to day operation of the program is supervised by the Deputy Chief Scott Feener of BPS and RCMP Staff Sargent Steve MacQueen.



The need for the LCSSP continues to grow. We anticipate this growth rate will continue. The complexities of referrals has also increased. Support for program growth and sustainability are vital for the success of this program.



This data reflects the municipality the client resides in and doesn't reflect the complexity of need or the frequency of service.

LCSSP SERVICE:

Although it is difficult to provide an exact number, we have collected the following estimates to reflect presentations, educational session participation, public events etc. Examples of these presentations included, our "Fighting Fraud Together" campaign, 2 Seniors Safety Academy series, Living Alone series, 55 Alive program, Falls Forum, several health and wellness fairs, being part of the panel at the Alzheimer Society Annual Breakfast, presenting at the LCLC, a Speak Easy and other presentations held at many community events and locations around the county. Topics covered included elder abuse, fighting frauds and scams, fall prevention, living alone, Vial of Life, Senior Friendly, the LCSSP and other topics important to seniors.

One of the most important services offered through the LCSSP are home visits. This service involves working one to one with individuals who are in need of support, information, advocacy and assistance with connecting to services available. Below is an excerpt from a letter received from a family member. It reflects what many of our clients and their loved ones say about the program.

"You and your predecessor were the only continuous care my mother received between February 2016 and August 2017 when she was taken into care by adult protection. Your continuous support during this period made a huge difference to me and my sister, knowing that someone in the "system" understood the problem and all that had been done to try to help my mother. She went repeatedly to the hospital, both the ER and to Mental Health. You were an advocate tirelessly to have her assessed for capacity in order to open up other care options. You listened to my concerns, and you were a comfort to my mother when she needed someone to talk to. You have done more than anyone else combined in the Health Care system to care for my mother and ensure her safety. I thank you from the bottom of my heart for this, and please know you made a real difference for both of us. I cannot count the number of calls and emails you made as an advocate for my mother, and for me. I cannot tell you what a comfort it was to be able to speak to someone who was looking at the bigger picture of my mother's safety and quality of life and presenting options that made sense, rather than checking things off a list."

REFERRALS:

In 2017, we received 196 referrals and served 250 clients. Not all clients accept service and some may accept service but choose not to follow through with recommendations. In 2017, 90% accepted service, 1% accepted service but refused recommendations, 4% either refused service or we were unable to contact them. The remaining 5% is undetermined.

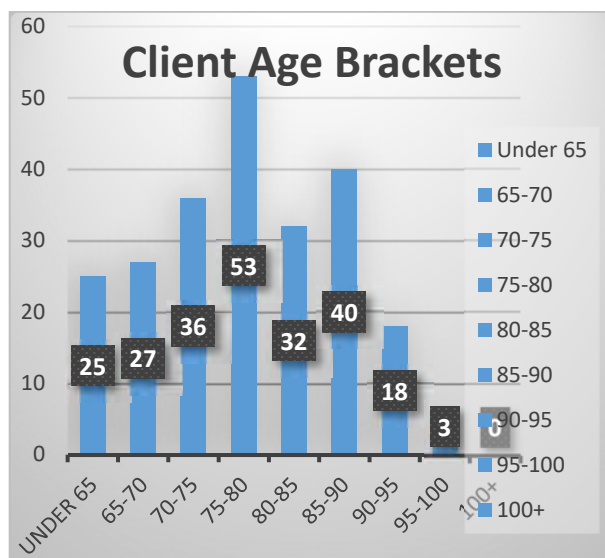
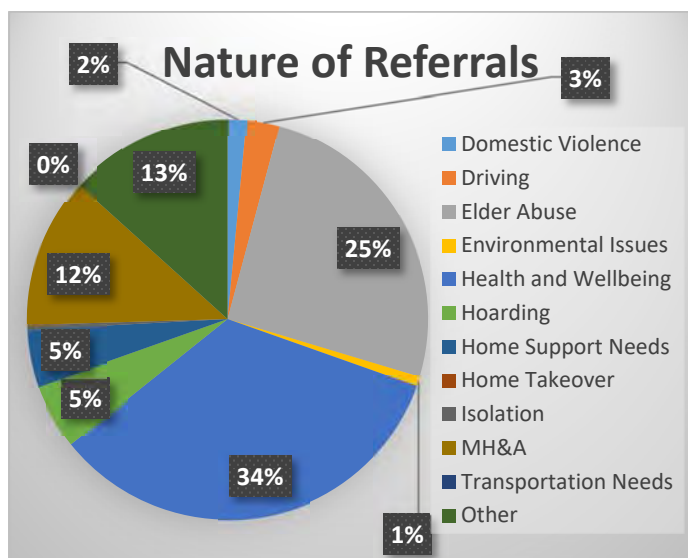
Referral sources include, law enforcement, healthcare practitioners, lawyers, government employees and officials, community, business owners, family, friends and/or the senior themselves. The most common concerns were related to health and wellbeing, elder abuse and mental health. The area titled "Other" would include referrals involving housing and other senior safety issues not targeted in our current reporting format. Hoarding continues to be a significant concern and often not the initial reason for the referral. The reason for referral can only be considered the "catalyst for contact" as there may be many other safety concerns.

We refer clients to many allied partners including but not limited to, continuing care, home support agencies, adult protection, community groups such as Helping Hands, Lions, Salvation Army, church groups etc, Community Dispute Resolution Program, legal aid, free legal clinic, G.E. Trucking and Kaiser Meadow, community transportation options, law enforcement, Caregiver NS, Alzheimer Society, Alcoholics Anonymous, Support Groups, Government Grants/income assistance, Housing, Housing support case workers, mental health, VON programs etc.

- David Walker and Chris Acomb, SSC worked as part of a provincial working group and the Department of Seniors to develop a logic model to be used as a guide by Senior Safety Programs in the province and multi-year funding for the program. This has been achieved with the introduction of a new grant application and 3 year committed funding of \$25,000 yearly with approved applications and criteria met.
- Working with clients, their loved ones, WRHA, housing support case workers, Adult Protection and health care providers we have assisted twenty-two seniors with moving to senior apartments, residential care facilities, private care facilities and/or alternate housing.
- We provided direct support and assistance in approximately 12 cases where hoarding and/or over-abundance of clutter was negatively impacting safety. Working with the client(s), their support systems, GE Trucking and Kaiser Meadow we were able to help them begin the journey of de-cluttering.
- 6 clients have required our services to assist with legal issues. We help clients connect to legal aid, free legal counsel, assist with setting up appointments, attend court as support, read legal letters to individuals and attend appointments as support. Legal issues requiring LCSSP support were driving issues, domestic violence and sexual assault.
- Helping clients connect to government programs is ongoing and is difficult to tally. CRA is another area where frequent support is needed as some seniors have difficulty navigating the system and completing forms.
- We continue to work closely with law enforcement and partner with healthcare professionals, lawyers, private business, service providers such as 211 etc. We also enjoy working with community groups such as the Salvation Army, United Way, Lions Club, Legions, Fire Departments and Girl Guides. Government employees and officials continue to also be a great resource and support.
- This year we began a more formalized reporting system using an excel spreadsheet and revised new referral form. Both of which have proved to be effective and useful.

ORIGIN: Staff

RECOMMENDATION

That Mike Bevis and Rebecca Zolkower be appointed as Municipal Fire Inspectors for the Municipality.

DISCUSSION

The Municipality's Fire Inspector has ended her employment with the Municipality for another career opportunity. Staff is currently working on filling the position. However, in the meantime the Municipality needs to appoint a Fire Inspector should any issues arise that need to be addressed by a Fire Inspector. Staff is recommending that the municipality's Building Officials be appointed as the municipality's Fire Inspectors. Once the Fire Inspector/Building Official position is filled the municipality's Building Officials will continue their fire inspector appointments serving as back-up to the Fire Inspector.

The Fire Safety Act requires that the municipality appoint one or more Fire Inspectors. Typically, the Chief Administrative Officer can make appointments of staff to administer Council's by-laws and policies. However, Council's policy respecting a system of fire inspections (MDL-26) specifically states that "Council" shall appoint one or more Municipal Fire Inspectors.

Councillor Ernst requested that Municipal Council be provided certain information pertaining to the defined benefit pension plan at the Municipal Council meeting held on April 24, 2018.

This information as requested is as follows:

1. The current number of active employees on the plan: 33
2. The number of past employees on the plan (vested members): 23
3. The interest rate: in 2017, the plan earned 8.35% after expenses
4. How much is the plan costing MODL: the employer cost is 9.8% of current employee's wages

The Municipality also has a defined contribution pension plan for new employees. There are currently 9 employees on this plan with 4 others joining in this fiscal year based on Provincial legislative requirements. The Municipality matches employee contributions between 6% and 8% of wages.

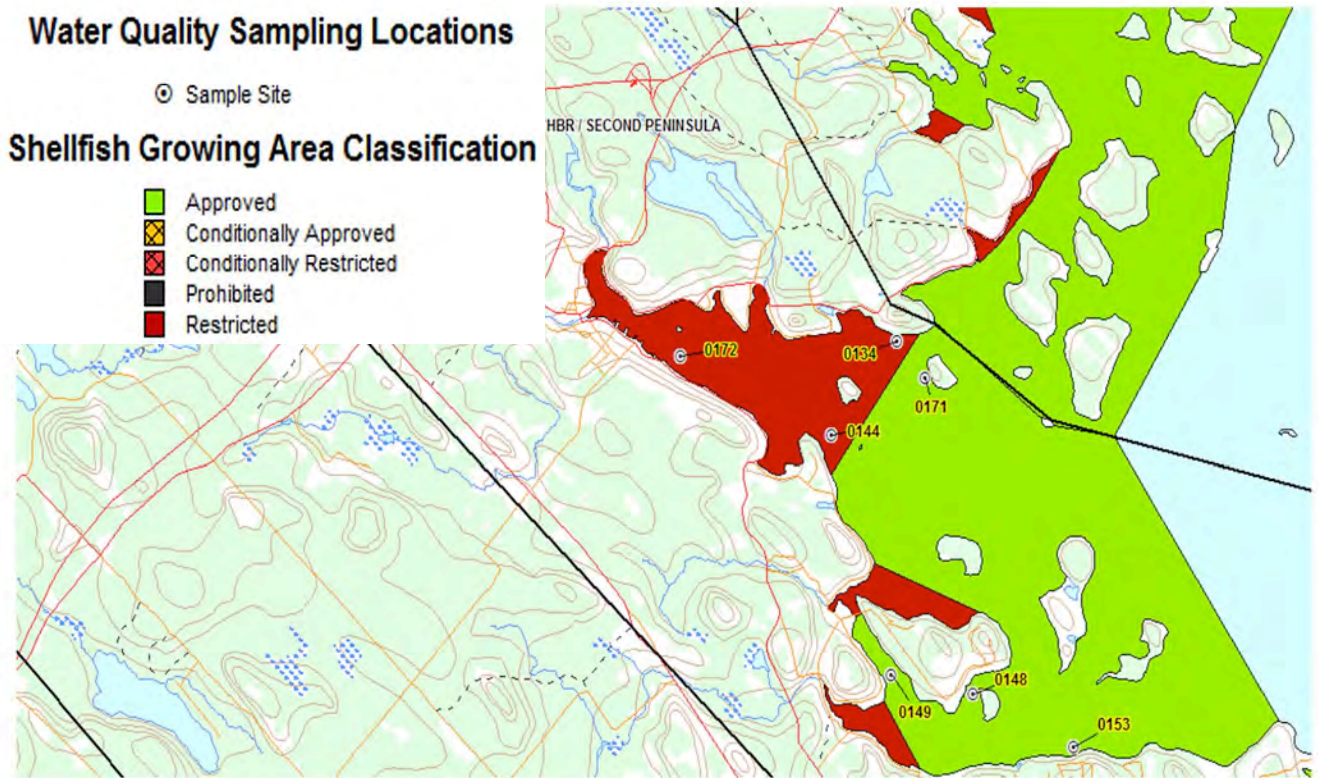
